## City Distributes Free PPE to Local Businesses

In its ongoing mission to support local businesses, the City of Veneta recently partnered with the state's economic development agency, Business Oregon, to distribute three pallets of personal protective equipment (PPE) free of charge to local businesses who desperately needed it. The initiative

reached 29 local businesses including restaurants, salons, auto shops, construction companies, and more. At a time when bottom lines have been battered by lockdowns and businesses are constantly adapting to changing regulations, business owners were thrilled to have the help.

"I almost broke down in tears," said Sierra Ayres of Salon on 5<sup>th</sup>. "We were having so much trouble even finding the gloves, masks, and sanitizers that we are legally required to use. And when we could, the prices were through the roof because everyone else is doing the same thing."

Gloves and masks are particularly hard to find, and when they are available, they are frequently two or three times the pre-pandemic price, according to Veneta-Fern Ridge Chamber of Commerce President Jason Alansky. "Having access to free PPE has been critical for

## Maureen Wright Sworn in as City Councilor

Local entrepreneur Maureen Wright is chasing the sweet life. After deciding to pursue her dream of becoming a chocolatier, she joined a free mentorship program offered through the City of Veneta's Oregon RAIN Accelerator Program. With their help and encouragement, she launched Temper & Mo Chocolates in 2018 and began marketing her award-winning seasonal

and custom chocolate treats. Wright was so inspired by the experience that she wanted to give back to the City and community that supported and encouraged her. So last November, she threw her hat in the ring, and on January 11, was sworn in as a Veneta City Councilor.

"I had never run for public office," Wright said. "But, when I learned how the City supports its entre-

preneurs and cares about the people who live here, I decided I wanted to play a bigger role. So I jumped in!"

A mother of three, business woman, and University of Oregon graduate, Wright has lived in Veneta since 2010. As City Councilor, she will use her unique entrepreneurial skills to ensure that Veneta continues to create business opportunities within the community.

"Maureen comes onboard at a perfect time," said City Administrator Matt Michel. The City has a Five-Year Economic Development Plan focused on building an ecosystem of entrepreneurs in Veneta, he explained. In the coming months, the Council will consider adopting a follow-on Plan to guide the City for the next five years.

both safety and financial stability, especially at area restaurants," he said. "The local business community really appreciates the State and City getting us the protective equipment we need."

With the City's Public Works crew providing logistical support, City staff distributed enough sanitizing wipes, masks, no-touch thermometers, sanitizer, and gloves to get businesses through the

next couple of months. It still has 40,000 masks on hand, which it hopes to distribute over the coming months. And, should Business Oregon offer another round of supplies, Veneta's Management Ana-

lyst Jana Weaver says, "we'll do it again, because it means we're helping our community stay safe and our businesses survive."

"The fact that she has participated in the Oregon RAIN program means she'll bring practical experience to that dis-

cussion."

Wright also brings a passion for event planning and looks forward to helping the Council establish

its two-year goals. She has already been appointed as a liaison to the City Park Board.

"I am so excited to

serve," Wright added. "I feel so lucky to be able to do the things that I love in the place that I call home."

## Veneta Partners for Pallet Shelter Project

When opportunity knocks, Veneta answers. And it pulls together. Nothing better illustrates that than the quick and efficient rollout of the "pallet shelter" initiative at the Veneta Warm Shelter on East Broadway.

Staffed by a small group of volunteers at Valley United Methodist Church (VUMC), the Warm Shelter opens when temperatures are forecast to dip below 28 degrees, providing a warm bed and meals for the local homeless. But COVID-19 forced the Shelter to reduce its capacity from 24 guests to just 15. In November, Lane County approached the Shelter with a pro-

posal.

Using COVID relief funds, the County had purchased 120 pallet shelters. Essentially the "Ikea approach" to quickly deployable housing, these 64-square foot modular structures include fold-down cots and heaters, accommodate two, and can be erected in an hour. The county offered to "lease" six of the units to the Shelter at no cost to restore its capacity to 25 guests, with one unit set aside to accommodate those showing symptoms of COVID-19.

"We could not accept the offer without a government partner," said VUMC Pastor Deena Wolfe. So she reached out to the

City of Veneta.

"There was no question that the City would help," said City Administrator Matt Michel. That included signing a lease agreement with the County and streamlining the City's temporary permit process. With the County covering all costs, the shelters were ready to occupy in a matter of weeks.

"This project would not have happened without the City's help," said Wolfe. "It was the driving force that made it possible."

"Such partnerships are how we get things done here in Veneta," added Michel. "The strength of our City is our small town

compassion. And rather than waiting for the City government to step in, community members often take the lead in helping their neighbors. That's exactly how our citizen government is supposed to work — local government in close partnership with its citizens."

Now, when the weather turns, no one will be turned away. What will become of these temporary shelters in the future is unknown. But one thing is certain: if an opportunity arises, the City of Veneta, its community organizations, and its citizens will partner to make the best of it.

## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

In 2020 we added two new shopping options for you with the opening of the Grocery Outlet Market and the Dollar General Store. We have had several requests for information about residential development and it looks promising for 2021.

The City has worked diligently throughout the year to develop, and just adopted, the 2020 Veneta Parks, Recreation and Open Space Master Plan, which will guide development of the City's park system for the next 20 years.

## VENETAWORKS

VenetaWorks is a collection of programs, events, and initiatives hosted by the City of Veneta in partnership with Oregon RAIN (Regional Accelerator and Innovation Network), and RDI (Rural Development Initiatives), aimed at promoting and supporting entrepreneur-based economic development. Among its activities, the program brought experts to the community for a monthly topic-driven speaker series, launched an accelerator program to help local businesses grow, and helped area entrepreneurs find the resources they need.

This year, more than 30 entrepreneurs took advantage of the VenetaWorks services to help launch or improve their businesses. We created shopfern-

ridge.com – an online marketplace where items from several local entrepreneurs are displayed for ordering. They are now rolling out Shop Veneta gift cards to encourage people to shop locally.



VenetaWorks also worked with the Veneta-Fern Ridge Chamber of Commerce and the City Staff to bring sizzle to the summer 2020 Downtown Popup Retail District. One result from all of this support of our local entrepreneur ecosystem was local entrepreneurs coming together to create the holiday season debut of "The Emporium." Turning the long time eating establishment on the corner of Territorial and Dunham into a Holiday Bazaar where for 2 months customers could shop for holiday items from a variety of local vendors.

## CITY FINANCES

In 2020, our City once again approved a balanced budget and for the 7<sup>th</sup> year in a row received the prestigious Government Finance Officers' Association "Distinguished Budget Award". Our Financial Director, Shauna Hartz retired after almost 20 years of service to Veneta. She hopes to spend time with her family and to also get out and enjoy the great outdoors and all it

offers. She especially wants to go camping

and visit National Parks.

The City has hired Caitlin (Caiti) Hippler to be our new Finance Director. She has recently completed her Master of Public Administration at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. She most recently worked as Director of Academic Operations at Nevada State College near Las Vegas.

## PUBLIC WORKS

The Public Works Department has, as usual, kept the City running smoothly and looking great without much of the fanfare they deserve.

This year we completed upgrades to the decking at the pool. However, because of the COVID-19 Virus, we were sad to not be able to open the pool. We also had a grand opening of the new and improved City Park. The park was enlarged, with a new stage, new playground equipment, and new paths for walking. The Public Works Department was also instrumental in Veneta adding a new parking lot for Broadway shopping and dining at 4<sup>th</sup> and Broadway. This year because of the COVID-19 Virus,

big changes were made to the annual Christmas Parade.

The City along with the Veneta-Fern Ridge Chamber of Commerce presented "Lights on Broadway", a reverse parade where the floats and displays were fixed and the cars drove by for all to enjoy. Santa and his helpers were at the Veneta Elementary School to wave to the children who were cuddled up nice and warm in their family's car. It has been estimated that in excess of 1,200 carloads of happy families drove by. Thanks to the hard work of the Public Works Department, Lane County Sheriff's Office, and others, it went off without a hitch and was enjoyed by all.

## PUBLIC SAFETY

My hat's off to the Sergeant and Deputies that work in Veneta under contract from the Lane County Sheriff's Office. They have worked very hard under difficult circumstances to keep us all safe and secure as we stayed close to home this year. Many of them had to work long hours on the front lines of the fires around the state and helped to save lives. After serving our community for about 4 years, Sgt. Sieczkowski was tapped to lead a new McKenzie River post because of his leadership during the fires. We welcomed Sgt. Ware, who has roots in the community going back to when his father patrolled the Veneta area for the Sheriff's Office. Also, I would be remiss if I didn't take a minute to express the thanks from the

whole community for all of the good work the Lane Fire Authority does on a daily basis to save lives and keep us safe. They, along with the Lane County Sheriff's Deputies have a thankless job, and we do appreciate it. They run to trouble when we run away. They are all heroes.



The City has agreed to provide funds in 2021 to help the Fern Ridge School District add the position of School Resource Deputy. There are many things that this will provide to the citizens of Veneta, most importantly, helping to keep our children safer. The program is scheduled to begin next year depending on whether the schools can reopen to student attended learning.



## EVENTS

Due to the COVID-19 restrictions, most of the normal city events had to be canceled for this year. Although we did, as mentioned previously, have a modified Christmas Parade, and we participated in a drive-by Easter event. I, along with City Administrator Matt

Michel and the City Staff, handed out Easter goodies to the children as their parents slowly drove up. We are so hopeful that next year we can go back to our full slate of events for our residents.



## LOOKING FORWARD - VISIONS & GOALS FOR 2021

As I look forward, my biggest wish is for us to all overcome the COVID-19 Virus and get back to lives we all miss. I don't know about you, but I could sure use a big hug! I am proud of how our community has responded to keep each other safe and to mitigate the spread of the virus locally and limit the sickness as much as possible.

Some of the things I see the City working on in 2021 to hopefully make your lives better are:

- Free WiFi internet at City Park and the Administrative Center parking lot to help those kids and adults who need internet access for school or work.
- A new park trails study to develop a vision for connecting our parks and providing paths to enjoy living in our city.
- Continued progress on designing a new pathway connecting Veneta and Elmira so our school children can navigate between the two cities, to go to and from school.
- The continued progress towards expanding Highway 126 to 4 lanes between Eugene and Veneta to help with growth and to help make the highway safer for travelers.
- A new 5-year Economic Development Plan that includes a commitment to try to eliminate the road blocks to providing a Fiber network to residents.
- I think we are very close to a group of entrepreneurs opening a brewery right here in downtown Veneta.
