Rate Increase and Public Safety Fee

At their November 8, 2021 meeting, the Veneta City Council unanimously approved water and sewer rates for 2022. These rates were the result of studies that looked at what is needed to keep the infrastructure in good working condition. The City of Veneta does not profit from water and sewer services and fees represent the predicted cost of the system, its operation, and improvements necessary to expand its capacity.

City of Veneta water rates increased 2%. This increase is the last in a series of recommended rate

changes from the City's water rate study. The City will perform another study this year to determine recommended rate changes for future years. City of Veneta sewer rates increased 7%. The main cost drivers are capital projects: the Jack Kelley Drive Lift Station that was completed in 2019, and the wastewater treatment plant expansion that will start the pre-design stage this year. Fees collected from water and sewer usage go directly toward maintaining and improving the Veneta Municipal Water and Sewer System.

Communication Survey Results

The City of Veneta is dedicated to strong communications with and for our community. In order to continue providing content you value, we need your feedback. That's where the 2021 Communication Survey came in. The City sent a survey out with the October utility bills and newsletter, asking you to grade us on several communication areas. We are incredibly thankful to those who took the time to participate and are excited to share the results of that survey.

The 2021 survey received 139 responses. The average survey respondent's age was 65-years-old. Survey respondents, while not entirely reflective of the average Veneta resident, provided the City with val-

able information about the community's communication preferences.

Now, to the results: Residents requested more communication regarding public safety and development/construction activity within the City. While there was a clear preference for the newsletter, respondents were interested in email communication from the City.

Respondents graded the City on its communication performance. While the newsletter performed well, you've let us know to improve on our digital communication channels. Further, the City does a good

Winter Storm Clean-Up

The snow storm that marked the end of 2021 and beginning of 2022 was, for many, a joyous occasion met with celebration and many a snow angel. Now that those winter storms are winding down, City of Veneta Public Works needs your help to keep everything flowing as it should be. Winter weather events can cause debris to enter the drainage system, which would potentially lead to flooding and other stormwater issues.



While Public Works clear drainage areas along public roads, the drainage areas that abut private property are the homeowner's responsibility. Veneta residents should begin by looking at their trees

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Rate Increase continued

Conserving water is the most direct way customers can impact their bill. The City of Veneta shares water conservation tips along with its annual Consumer Confidence Report. The 2020 edition includes recommendations to regularly check for leaks, ensuring washing machines are full before using, using native or draught-resistant plants, and turning off automatic sprinklers when rain is in the forecast. The full 2020 Report is available on the City's website.

The new bill also includes a Public Safety Fee. The Fee was first proposed to the City Council at their May 24, 2021 Work Session. Once the Council determined the need for the Fee, the City engaged the public for feedback on the proposal for several months. At its July 12, 2021 meeting, the City Council

adopted the Public Safety Fee and set the amount at its meeting on August 9. As adopted, the Fee will be a \$4.00 per month on developed properties that goes toward funding the City's public safety services. It's important to note that the Fee will be re-evaluated annually and the amount will change as service needs do.

And remember, if you need help paying your City utility bill, the City has a low-income payment program for customers who earn 60% or below of the state median income. Applications must come with accepted proof of income. Qualifying customers who successfully apply can expect to see a 25% reduction in their base charges. Please call us to learn more.

and shrubs and check for any obvious damage. If you believe you may have a damaged tree, the City recommends reaching out to a tree service. Remember that the City regulates tree felling – if you have a tree you plan to bring down, call the City and check to see if you need a permit.

Once you know your trees are clear, begin to look into your storm drainage areas and ditches. Clear any debris that may impact the flow of water in any way.

The City hopes that, by taking these steps, homeowners and the City alike can avoid flooding on private property or public roadways.

- The Veneta Community Pool reopened in 2021 with modified operations due to COVID. As you know, the previous year we were unable to open at all, so it was great to make this treasured community jewel shine again.



July

- On the 4th of July, I was honored to help dedicate the new VFW memorial and mural at the Veneta City Park. I joined several guest speakers. August

There were free hot dogs sponsored by SaniPac and served by the members of the Alliance Church, demonstrations of equipment, and a Dunk-a-Deputy tank, operated by the Veneta Sheriff's Deputies to benefit the family of Amado Hernandez. I am very appreciative of our Deputy Sheriffs', and Lane County Sheriff Cliff Harrold's, willingness to celebrate our community with us.



Looking Back - Highlights from 2021

August continued

- We took a significant step towards sustainably funding our police services by creating a Public Safety Fee. Research was done and shared, comments taken, hearings held, and afterwards the Council enacted a new Public Safety Fee starting this year. Every year, the Council will re-evaluate the fee amount to balance community needs and affordability.

September

- I sent an open letter to the community asking for every resident to come together to help fight this terrible virus we have been living through. I mentioned that I was fully aware of the controversy of vaccinations throughout our nation, however; if not for ourselves, but for our children, please consider getting vaccinated and boosted as soon as you can.
- The Veneta Harvest Festival was a big hit. There were vendor booths, a kid zone, and a Chili cook-off. Also, there was a new Kiwanis Kruise-in Car and Motorcycle Show that really added excitement to the day. These attractions brought our community together to celebrate the many things we are thankful for.

November

- We brought back the Business Assistance Committee to help our local entrepreneurs and businesses with business grants.

December

- On December 2nd we had the annual Christmas Tree Lighting ceremony. Santa highlighted the event and listened to the Christmas wishes of hundreds of little children. The Kiwanis provided hot chocolate, which came in handy on that cold December night. Thanks to the City Public Works department for procuring the beautiful tree that seemed to touch the sky, and for the set up for this and all the other City events throughout the year.
- On December 9th the annual Veneta Christmas Light Parade was again a big hit. The sidewalks were filled with families waiting eagerly to see the firetruck with Santa on board to start the parade. The parade stretched on with many beautifully decorated floats. A good time was had by all especially our precious children.



Additional highlights throughout 2021

- ODOT contributed \$100,000 to the project to build a safe path between Veneta and Elmira.
- 2021 marked Veneta's 12th consecutive Tree City Award and 9th consecutive Budget Presentation Award.
- Throughout the year we distributed tens of thousands of masks, gloves, and sanitizer to Veneta businesses to help them manage the cost of being COVID safe. The City also distributed \$56,000 in COVID CARES funds to local businesses, in addition to the County's \$5.5 million to 122 Veneta-based business recipients.
- The environmental analysis for the OR 126 Widening project continued all last year and included several public outreach efforts to gauge public support and concerns with the project. Veneta citizens and our surrounding neighbors are very supportive of the project. This is important because the project will only get funded if there is very strong support for it.
- We got a lower interest rate on the City's \$2.8 million in sewer debt, which will save nearly \$750,000 in interest costs over the life of the bonds.
- And finally, we won two economic development grants in 2021: One to support the expansion of The Emporium into the adjacent outdoor space, and one to support our local food entrepreneurs with a training lab and technical assistance for local businesses.

Looking Forward - Visions & Goals for 2022

Some of the things I see the City working on, in 2022, to hopefully make your lives better are:

- A new restroom building for the City Park has been purchased. We are anxiously awaiting delivery so it can be installed.
- Continued progress on designing a new pathway connecting Veneta and Elmira, so our school children can navigate between the two cities.
- Finalizing the environmental analysis for expanding Highway 126 to 4 lanes between Eugene and Veneta to help with growth and make the highway safer for travelers.
- Finding an affordable option to provide high speed broadband to the citizens of Veneta.
- Engaging the community to update the Bolton Hill Sports Complex Master Plan. Eventually we would like to provide a first-class place for our children to participate in their favorite sports.
- We hope to have completion of the Madrone Ridge subdivision of 38 new homes in 2022. The roads and infrastructure are being done so you can finally drive on the new section of 8th Street south of Bolton Hill Road.
- The City is working to find a desirable location large enough to house an off-leash dog park for our furry friends.
- You'll see lots of street maintenance work this summer as part of the City's efforts to keep our streets in good shape for long term savings.
- And renovating the Community Center at City Park to make it a desirable destination for our larger family events and special life occasions.

I would like to take a minute to thank everyone for their patience and understanding during these hard times. The City and I do appreciate the positive feedback we have received this year. It spurs us on and keeps us looking forward.
